

I Always Feel Like Somebody's Watching Me: The World of Sherlock Holmes Statues

When I was a boy, we had forty five statues of saints in my house. Ever have ninety eyes looking at you every time you have to go to the bathroom? Pat Cooper.

Starting out I don't know if we will reach 50 statues, but I do know that, be it Bronze, Wood, Granite, Glass, Wax, Sand, Ice, Sticks and even Living statues... Sherlock Holmes is represented in every sculpting medium, from everywhere around the world. Here is a look at the many we know of (with a bit of silliness included), and we hope you the reader will inform us of the many more we have missed.

We begin our journey with a statue of Sherlock Holmes, The 1999 statue by the sculptor John Doubleday, which is probably John Doubleday's most well-known sculpture, but not the only one of his we will be mentioning. It stands near the supposed site of 221B Baker Street, the fictional detective's address in London, located outside of the Baker Street Station on Marylebone Road. It is a good starting place since every Sherlockian who has visited Baker Street has probably seen it while exiting the underground, or passing by on a double decker tour bus, and surely has taken pictures of it.

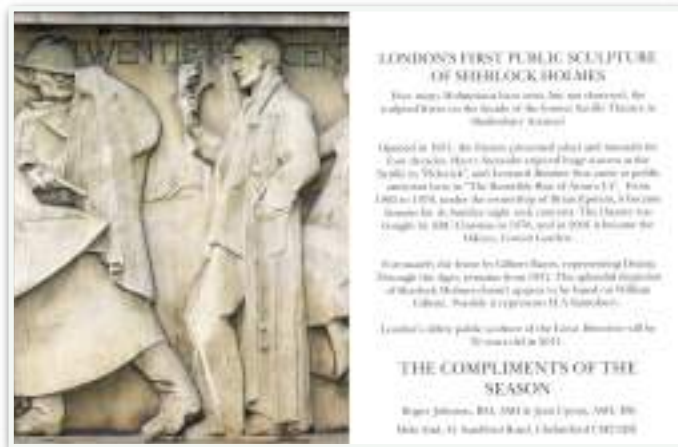

Let us next see how many more Sherlock Holmes statues that follow you've observed or heard of.

London's first public sculpture of Sherlock Holmes, and Moriarty, was part of a sculpted frieze by Gilbert Bayes on the facade of the former Saville Theatre on Shaftesbury Avenue. The Saville Theatre opened in 1931, and its frieze representing 'Drama Through the Ages' remains today, although the theatre was renamed the Odeon, Covent Garden. There does seem to be some debate however as to which Sherlock Holmes actor is depicted by the sculpture. Some claim it's William Gillette, others such as Roger Johnson in his 2010 Christmas picture below suggests H. A. Saintsbury, while still a third possibly exists in Todd Slaughter. Given the fact Slaughter was a very popular Holmes in London theatre for the time frame of the construction, appearing on stage as Holmes in "The Speckled Band" (1923,1925), "Sherlock Holmes" (1925), and "Return of Sherlock Holmes" (1928), he also must be considered a valid candidate. Who do you think this Holmes depiction was modeled after, Gillette, Saintsbury, or Slaughter?

The granite 'Sherlock & Segar Statue' was dedicated on 7 December 2019, in Chester, Illinois, and can be observed there, both day and night. Sherlock's visage borrows the countenance of Elzie Segar, Popeye's creator, as a tribute to his compelling interest in 'The Detective'. Segar was one of the earliest Americans to promote the "Sherlockian" subculture and imagery, and he did so in his internationally syndicated cartoon series, "Thimble Theatre" (1919). Each donor has their Name/Inscription forever paired with one of the 'Adventures' penned by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, by a permanent etching on one of the 30 Pavers surrounding the Life Size monument to the Eternal Sleuth.

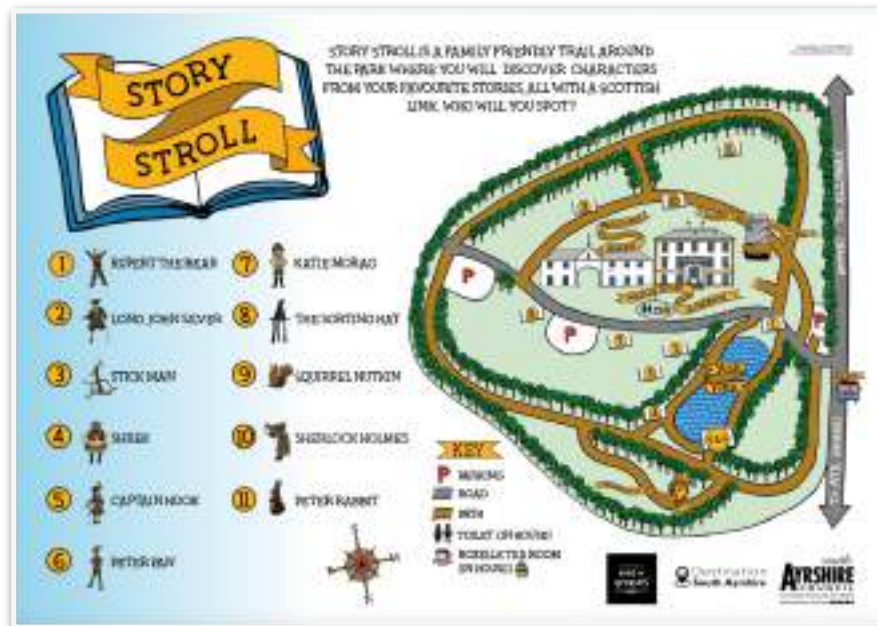

There is a display of statues made of twigs dotted around the park. They give children a map to find them. The Story Stroll Map

“South Ayrshire Council is delighted to unveil the final event in Once Upon a Time in South Ayrshire - Story Stroll. Story Stroll is running as part of a program of events supported by EventScotland as part of the Year of Stories 2022. Rozelle Park has been transformed into a playground for well-loved storybook characters, most of whom are drawn from Scotland's rich literary heritage. Follow the family-friendly self-led trail around Rozelle Park to find 11 spectacular willow sculptures specially created by local artist David Powell. These include J.M. Barrie's classic characters and arch rivals Captain Hook and Peter Pan; the Sorting Hat from Harry Potter; Rupert Bear; Robert Louis Stevenson's Long John Silver; Mairi Hedderwick's young adventurer Katie Morag; Beatrix Potter's Squirrel Nutkin and Peter Rabbit; Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes; beloved Scottish ogre Shrek and the intrepid Stick Man. The trail is free for everyone and can be enjoyed in any order, as one complete trail or in smaller parts. The trail will be extended in 2023 to Troon, Prestwick, Maybole and Girvan.”¹ Children can find out a little more information on how the character links to Scotland's Year of Stories, by scanning the QR code on the information board located at each character. They are wonderful works, but I wonder how long stick statues last?

From Workshop to Moscow

Vasily Livanov and Vitaly Solomin were immortalized as Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson as a bronze statue, near the British embassy in Moscow, Russia. Sculptor Andrey Orlov, dedicated it in 2007. Vasily Livanov noted, if you sit next to the doctor and hold on to his notebook, all problems and doubts will be resolved. But if you touch the pipe of the famous detective, your worries will noticeably increase. On my visit, Raisa and I put coins in Dr. Watson's book for good luck!

Did you know there exists a brass statue of Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson in the city of Yekaterinburg (Ural), Russia? This sculpture was installed inside the new shopping-entertainment center "Greenwich" there. Thus, since 2017 in Russia there are two Sherlock Holmes monuments, and both have a resemblance to actors Vasily Livanov (who played the great detective on Soviet TV in 1980s) and Vitaly Solomin (his Dr. Watson).. The writing on the book that Sherlock Holmes is holding translates to "Sculptor Igor Akimov".

The Sherlock Art Hotel at Mazā Monētu 3 Riga, Latvia is a Victorian style accommodation gem in the heart of Old Riga. It features an incredible Sherlock Holmes statue with a pipe in one hand and gun in the other protruding from its wall. The people of Riga dress as characters from Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes stories and gather to celebrate the birthday of Sherlock Holmes every January 6th. Jauniela (New Street) in Riga is charming Latvian lane which doubled as Baker Street on Russia's version of Sherlock Holmes (1979-1986), starring Vasily Livanov and Vitaly Solomin.

Ken Nobuhara (1892-1977), lived in Oiwake, Japan, translated nearly all of Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes works into Japanese. This statue of Sherlock Holmes in the woods of Oiwake was dedicated to him. It is located in Oiwake Kanazuka Park, Karuizawa Town, Kitasaku District, Nagano Prefecture.

England House in Kitano-Cho district, Kobe, Kansai, Japan. This house includes an exhibition of a Daimler limousine, the same model once used by British royalty, and a reproduction of a London underground platform, and a statue of Sherlock Holmes in the garden. In addition, there is also a reproduction of famed detective Sherlock Holmes' room. You can dress up in Holmes' clothing and take photos anywhere in the building. The facility operates as an English pub after regular hours.

Sherlockian Yuichi Hirayama, BSI ('The Japanese Vase'), is a dentist in Japan. He is the founder of the scion 'The Men with the Twisted Konjo', and the editor of an international Sherlockian magazine The Shoso-in Bulletin. He received the Irregular Shilling in 1993. Yuichi created his own 'Sherlock Holmes' statue, which can be spotted peering out his library window. He created it by himself, based on the 221B wax statue in the Canon. We quickly note that there is more than one recreation of the sitting-room, for example at the Sherlock Holmes Museum in Meiringen, another at the Sherlock Holmes Museum in Lucens, and another at the Holiday Inn on Union Square in San Francisco (now in storage), presumably all with busts from the Empty House.

In 2017 the world's largest bookstore opened in Tehran, Iran. The Book Garden is a gigantic green-roofed building measuring 154,000 square feet that has 12 miles of shelves packed with millions of books. The project is part of a larger 700,000 square foot complex that features several movie theaters, science halls, classrooms, a prayer room and a restaurant. At the Tehran Book Garden, you will find the Sherlock Holmes statue pictured below, and you can likely find Sherlock Holmes books translated into Persian, as the complex promotes a wide range of literature. Sherlock Holmes has a long history of popularity and translation in Iran.

Sherlock Holmes statue in Kharkiv, Ukraine. It is located near the building of the Scientific Research Forensic Center. The creative association "Territory of Sculpture" was created on the basis of the art workshop of the "Honored Artist of Ukraine" sculptor Alexander Ridny in 2005.

Felix Dennis (1947–2014) was an English publisher, poet, spoken-word performer and philanthropist owned one of the largest private collections of original bronze sculptures. He maintained it in his “Garden of Heroes and Villains” in Dorsington on the outskirts of Stratford, England. The statue of most interest for us in his collection is titled ‘Arthur Conan Doyle (with the Shade of Sherlock Holmes)’. This statue comprised a seated Arthur Conan Doyle writing, with the figure of Holmes looming over him from behind, and is the only one of creator and creation together we ever seen. The sculpture was sculpted for Mr. Dennis in 2001, by Irena Sedlecká, a Czech sculptor and Fellow of the Royal British Society of Sculptors. Located in the Heart of England Forest, it is only opened to the public for a few days each year to raise funds for the charity that is planting, preserving, and protecting native broadleaf woodland in the heart of England. So if you plan on seeing it, you had better check for when it is open to the public, which isn’t often.

The amazing Simon O'Rourke's tree carving 'Sherlock Holmes Bust'. "The Sherlock Holmes bust was for a private client who commissioned it as a gift. He's made from oak which means that although he is pale at the moment and has some yellow tones, in time he will get darker. The rings and markings will become black as it makes contact with rain, and the UV rays of the sun will cause the wood to pick up grayish hues. In combination with the natural darkening, it means that as he ages, the wood will become more reminiscent of the furniture and drawing room decor of the Sherlock's own era... Simon chose the Sidney Paget illustrations as his inspiration... The clues within the Sherlock Holmes Bust... 1. Stiletto dagger he used to pin correspondence to the mantle piece 2. Pince-nez glasses – The Golden Pince-nez 3. Honeycomb – His Last Bow 4. Broken crown – Musgrave ritual 5. Persian slipper he used for storing tobacco 6. Handgun 7. 221b plaque 8. Snake – The Speckled Band 9. Violin 10. Stick Men – The Adventure of the Dancing Men. simon@treecarving.co.uk"²

“Although we have come to associate Sherlock Holmes with a large, curved meerschaum pipe, there is actually no reference to this in the original stories.

A metal statue representing Sherlock Holmes, sculptor unknown, was spotted in Monschau, Germany, located in the Eifel, northwestern part of the Rhenish Slate Mountains. “We haven't found any information on this statue, except a paragraph in a touristic description of Monschau on TravelWorldOnline, which follows here in translation: What has Sherlock Holmes lost in Monschau? On the banks of the River Rur, where the Laufenbach flows in it, we encounter the mysterious metal figure of Sherlock Holmes. With the typical whistle in the mouth, the slider cap on the head and the long coat, the figure is hardly to be missed. In fact, the statue of Sherlock Holmes is reminiscent of an author from the Eifel region: Jacques Berndorf, once a freelance journalist, he began writing crime fiction in the 1980s, he researched his locations and stories accurately and reproduced them faithfully in his books. When Berndorf writes about a street in the Eifel with three lime trees, then this street really exists, and if one visits this street, one finds the described trees. How could it be otherwise: also Monschau appears in his Eifel crime fiction. Anyone who wants to know something about the Monschau region and the Eifel can do so in a very entertaining way by reading the Berndorf's Eifel crime fictions.”⁴ (submitted by Helena Machálková).

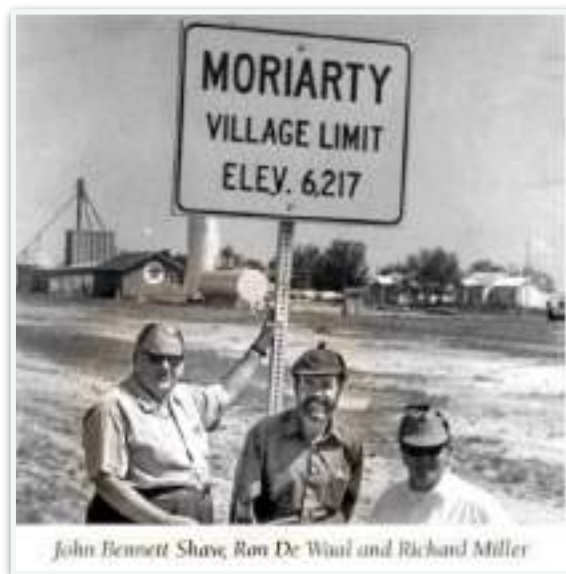

The children's favorite, first created by author Michael Bond in the 1950s, is known for his distinctive red hat and blue coat, but a specially commissioned series of life-size statues to be dotted around London landmarks gives him an entirely different look, as designed by some of Britain's best-known faces. Benedict Cumberbatch designed a 'Sherlock'-Themed Paddington Bear. The statues were auctioned off in aid of the children's charity NSPCC. The statue of Paddington Bear in a Sherlock Holmes costume resides at the Museum of London. Paddington is 3'6" tall.

Recently even, a new Detective Conan statue was been installed next to the flag hoist in front of the Hokuei Town Office. The title is “The Great Detective Turned Small”.

"We Let the Dawgs Out" began in 2003, as a public art exhibit, by the Athens-Oconee Women's Club. Three dozen statues were customized by local artists, and in 2010, they were auctioned off for \$25,000, which was donated to AIDS Athens. Many of the original statues can still be found in and around Athens, as well as across the state, including the Georgia Welcome Center at the border with South Carolina, on Interstate 85, St. Simons Island, and most recently, the campus of UGA in Tifton. Sherlock Holmes Dawg, ready to investigate, with a magnifying glass, can be found at 21 Jefferson Place, Athens, GA., the Endoscopy Center of Dr .Greg Smith.

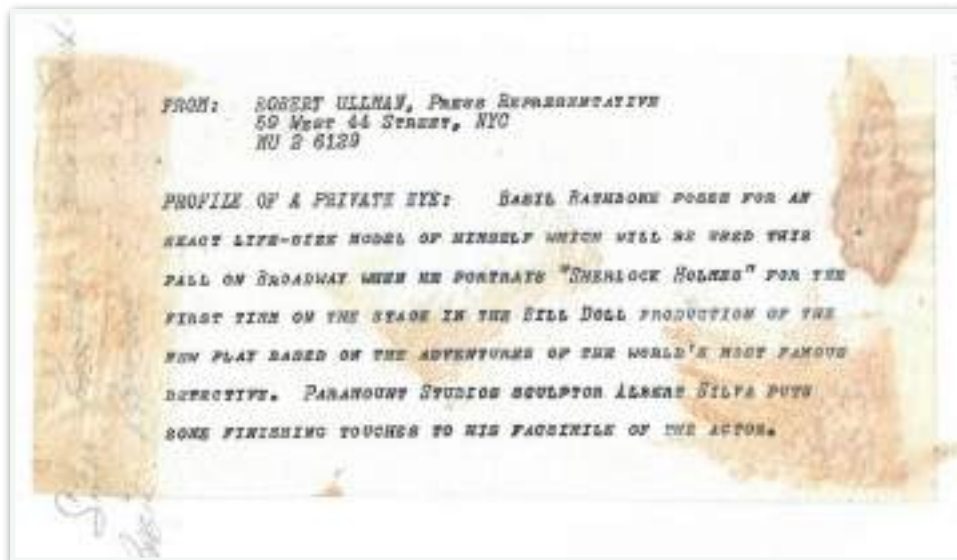

Sherlock Holmes has been linked to the La Biblioteca Pública Arús (the Arus Public Library) of Barcelona, Spain for over a decade. On March 29, 2011, an agreement was signed by Mr. Joan Proubasta to hand over life long his collection surrounding the figure of the famous detective. The collection started very early in Mr. Proubasta's life when, at just 13, he purchased a copy of *The Dog of the Baskerville*. Captivated and attracted by the plot and character, he bought the entire collection and soon devoured them all. Over the years he acquired editions and copies and, little by little, became one of the detective's great collectors. Also, about 27 years ago, the Holmes Circle association was founded, of which he was also president. This allowed him to establish friendly relationships with other collectors around the world, favoring the book exchange. When in 2011 the collection surrendered to the Library, it consisted of about 105.68 linear meters of documents and about 21.27 linear meters of objects. All of this making up a collection of over 6,000 books in 42 languages, and over 2,000 comics. Mr. Proubasta's collection contains hundreds of smaller Sherlock Holmes figurines and one awesome large bust he is seen proudly standing by in the below photo from the museum.

Sherlock Holmes' legacy lives on at the Elmer L. Andersen Library at the University of Minnesota, which is home to the world's largest collection of materials related to Holmes and his creator, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. The collection includes more than 60,000 pieces, from original publications and journals to eclectic odds and ends and even a life-size recreation of his sitting room. Established by the acquisition and donation of several significant personal collections (including those of noted Sherlockians John Bennett Shaw and Jennie Paton) and maintained through support from donors, the University's treasure trove has become a go-to resource for Sherlock enthusiasts the world over. This Linus statue is called Seeking Philanthropy My Dear Watson, with Linus dressed up as famous detective Sherlock Holmes. The statue was designed by artists Shane Anderson and Chuck Anderson and was sponsored by the Saint Paul Foundation. It is on display on the ground floor of the Elmer L. Andersen Library at the University of Minnesota.

The T-Rexes were the fourth GoGoDiscover Sculpture trail in Norwich, U.K. 2021. Previously, there had been gorillas, dragons, and hares. Lost Holmes was sponsored by Aspiration Europe and designed by artist Sally Adams. When you take inspiration from Arthur Conan-Doyle's 'Lost World' and 'Sherlock Holmes', you get something like 'Lost Holmes'. He has a cute deerstalker cap and a magnifying glass that actually works. Be sure to also read some of the quotes written on this T-Rex. You would have found it in the Lower Close of the Norwich Cathedral, however Lost Holmes has been moved from his 2021 spot to 32 Elm Hill the home of the Stoned & Hammered Jewelry Shop for 2022. The 2022 GoGoDiscover Trail in Norfolk includes 55 T-Rexes (21 returning from 2021) and 24 Steppe Mammals. There are also 100 small T-Rexes called Breakasaurus. Sculpture Trails are the result of a collaboration between Wild in Art and the charity Break.

Oor Wullie's BIG Bucket Trail ran for 11 weeks from 17th June 2019 – 30th August 2019, culminating in a series of farewell events and nationwide auctions in each of the five host cities, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Dundee, Aberdeen and Inverness. Located at The University of Edinburgh on the old college quad, is the statue of Oor Sherlock Holmes. Scottish crime fiction writer Ian Rankin and Edinburgh based artist Chris Rutterford have collaborated to pay tribute to one of Edinburgh's most celebrated writers, Arthur Conan Doyle. Wullie has been transformed into his most famous and iconic character Sherlock Holmes, complete with deerstalker hat, cape and pipe.
